WORK UNDER DEMANDING CONDITIONS



In Timor-Leste, Caritas supports a women's co-operative group called HAFOTI. Members of the group work together to produce their own quality products to make an income to help provide for their families.

Members from Oecusse work really hard to harvest rice and cut coconuts. When temperatures get up to 35 degrees it is very humid and can be tiring and exhausting work. This of course, makes completing the finished products of rice grain and virgin coconut oil even more rewarding!

Rural farmers living in the northern provinces of Cambodia rely on the food that they grow for both income and their daily diet. This is mainly rice and vegetables.

Mrs Prel Saorn and her two sons are one such example living in Pu Laes village within the province of Mondulkiri. Like the majority of rural farmers in Cambodia, they enjoy basic meals for breakfast and dinner (like the rice and greens in the photo).

Caritas Aotearoa New Zealand (Caritas) is the New Zealand Catholic Bishops' agency for justice, peace and development. Working together with the Catholic community for a world free of poverty and injustice, we strive to achieve this through community development, advocacy, education, and emergency relief. As part of Caritas Internationalis, a global confederation of 165 Catholic aid, development and social justice agencies operating in over 200 countries and territories, Caritas supports the poorest and most vulnerable, regardless of ethnicity, religion or nationality.

Since 2020, everything has been turned on its head due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
Communities all over the world have faced tough challenges. Most of us have learnt to adapt to find new ways of doing things.

Caritas continues to support communities around the world who have found that existing challenges have been magnified by the pandemic. Life does not get any easier when resources are harder to access and when there are limitations around movement.

Last year Caritas began a new partnership agreement with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade in relation to the ongoing Caritas development programme.

This new programme runs for five years and is called *He Oranga Taurikura*, which directly translates to 'A Thriving Life'. It is an integral human development programme that

enhances health and wellbeing, and develops more diverse and resilient livelihoods in seven countries (mainly in the Pacific). Like all the work of Caritas, it is underpinned by Catholic Social Teaching principles including human dignity, solidarity and participation. A tailored approach will meet the priorities of long-term partners in nutrition, food and water security, WASH, vocational and livelihoods education, access to credit, and climate change response and adaptation improvement. He Oranga Taurikura takes a long-term approach to supporting local partners to deliver to otherwise neglected rural populations in the remotest locations.
