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

Sunday Gospel Reading

Luke 4:1-13

Summary:

- Jesus is led by the Spirit into the wilderness where he is tempted by the devil for 40 days.
- During this time he did not eat anything.
- The devil tries to tempt Jesus to change a stone into bread.
- Jesus recites scripture saying, 'One does not live on bread alone'.
- Again the devil tempts Jesus offering him all the kingdoms of the world if he will worship him.
- Jesus again quotes Scripture saying, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'
- The devil tempts Jesus a third time challenging him to prove he is the Son of God by throwing himself on the pinnacle of the temple.
- Jesus refuses saying, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'
- The devil departed from Jesus when he had finished all the tests.

Theme: Dreaming of Something Better

As Lent begins we draw closer to God and remember Jesus' sacrifice on the cross and his love for others. We are challenged to put others before ourselves and dream for a better world. It is through simple acts of love by individuals (starting with us) that can transform our world for the better.

Caritas Focus: Lujan Home for Girls

Caritas supports Lujan Home for Girls in Vanimo, Papua New Guinea. This refuge home run by the SSVM Sisters look after around 30 girls as young as two years old. They operate the Home like a family caring for the girls like they are their own.

Security and food are two of the largest expenses which Caritas supports. Malnutrition is a significant issue in Papua New Guinea, so the Home aims to not only provide the girls with nutritionally balanced and varied diets, but also to teach the girls about nutrition and cooking so that they can bring these skills back to their families and communities when they leave the Home.

Reflection

It is hard to imagine how hard it must have been for Jesus to stay strong for such a long time out in the wilderness. He showed great strength and faith to overcome the devil. He was aware of something better to come. Jesus, himself, would change the world for the good of all.

Many of the girls living in Lujan Home have experienced some very hard challenges and have shown great strength and resilience. The Lujan Home runs on the providence of God, meaning that they run their organisation trusting that God will provide. In spite of the worry that food and funding will run out they have continued to dream of a life that is better for the girls. Their strength and faith remind us all to trust in God's will in every circumstance.

Sunday Gospel Reading

Luke 9:28-36

Summary:

- Jesus took Peter, James and John and went up a mountain to pray.
- While he was praying, Jesus became dazzling white.
- Moses and Elijah appeared and were talking to Jesus.
- They too appeared in glory and were discussing Jesus' departure.
- Peter and the others were tired but saw all that took place.
- Peter without thinking called out to Jesus offering to make three dwellings for Jesus, Moses and Elijah.
- A cloud appeared and enveloped them terrifying the three disciples.
- A voice was heard within the cloud saying, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!"
- Jesus was then found alone.
- The disciples never told anyone what happened.

Caritas Focus: Tutu Rural Training Centre

At the Tutu Rural Training Centre (TRTC) in Fiji, young men and women are being transformed. Training courses are provided at Tutu, to help learners develop the spiritual, intellectual and physical aspects of their life and make a positive impact in their community.

Teachers work together with the young men and women to fulfil their talents and potential and help them make the most of their opportunities. Young farmers learn skills in agriculture and become confident leaders in their villages. The single women's course helps the students to discover their natural talents and use them in small-business opportunities involving farming, textiles, handicrafts and cooking.

Reflection

Jesus was transformed on the mountain and this surprised his disciples and they saw him for who he really was.

Students at the Rural Training Centre are also transformed and are supported by others to find out more about themselves too. It is with the help of teachers and their peers that they find opportunities for the future.

Moses and Elijah were present with Jesus to confirm what was to come and what Jesus was to carry out. Sometimes we need those around us to provide guidance and confirmation of where we are going.

Fiji has had a tough time lately with cyclones and the impacts of the pandemic. However, the people have been strong and resilient and shown, in places like Tutu, that they can still work together for a positive future.


Find out more about the cyclones that have made landfall in Fiji in recent years.

Caritas Jerusalem's focus is not on determining who is at fault but rather on providing care to those affected – mainly the poor and marginalised.

At first glance, the parable of the fig tree does not appear to have a profound message. However, in the context of the situation in the Holy Land, where many fig trees grow, it is perhaps more profound. Amidst despair, there is always hope – especially with God's presence and help. Caritas Jerusalem has adaptively responded over the past 20 years to changing circumstances. With God's help, and the patience of so many, they have shown that fruit can come from even the most unpromising things.

Sunday Gospel Reading

Luke 13:1-9

Summary:

- Jesus is told about Galileans who were killed by Pilate.
- Jesus asks whether they think that because the Galileans suffered that they were any worse than others.
- He reminds them about the importance of repentance.
- After mentioning an accident that happened in Jerusalem with a tower killing 18 people, he repeats the message, "unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."
- Then he tells the parable of the barren fig tree.
- A man looks for fruit from a fig tree that was planted on his vineyard.
- It has produced no fruit in the last three years so he asks the gardener to cut it down as it is wasting the soil.
- The gardener requests that the man waits one more year before he cuts it down and promises to give it attention and care (putting manure on it).

Sunday Gospel Reading

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Summary:

- Tax collectors and sinners were coming to listen to Jesus and the Pharisees were complaining that Jesus was dealing with people like them.
- Jesus told them the Parable of the Prodigal Son.
- A man had two sons.
- The youngest son asked for his share of the inheritance so his father gave this to him. Soon after, the son left for a distant land and spent all of this money. He found himself without anything during a famine and was feeding pigs. He realised he needed to return to his father and say sorry and ask if he would have him back.
- The father ran to meet him and asked his slaves to provide him with clothes and to prepare a feast using the fatted calf as his son was 'alive again' and 'found'.
- The eldest son heard the celebrating and found out that it was for his brother. He was angry and refused to join in. He pointed out to his father that he had never done the same for him even after his endless obedience and service.
- The father explained that his eldest son had always been with him but his brother was lost and now found, dead and now back to life, so they had to celebrate.

Theme: A Fresh Start

Sometimes we face a situation where we are forced to make a fresh start. This can provide new opportunities but is often difficult as well.

As we continue on our Lenten journey, let's turn our attention to those who have had to start again.

Questions for Students

- Has there been a local or global emergency lately? How could you help?
- Do you know anyone who is making a fresh start? How could you support them?

Caritas Focus: Emergency Response

The global Caritas network consisting of 165 Caritas agencies stretches to every country on our planet. In fact, Caritas is the second largest humanitarian network in the world. Every year, we witness emergencies on a large scale and the Caritas network responds to all of these to meet the needs of those most affected, working with them to ensure a fresh start.

The photo board on the next page provides examples of where and how Caritas responded to emergencies in 2021. This included the pandemic response in India, landslides and flooding in Indonesia, the earthquake in Haiti, unrest in Afghanistan and ongoing needs in Bangladesh.

Reflection

In the Gospel reading, we discover a father who is full of compassion regardless of what the younger son has done. He celebrates the fact that his son is now both found and alive again. His love and care are instrumental in providing his son a fresh start and another go at life.

The father we read about in the Parable of the Prodigal Son has the same qualities as our father in heaven. God is both loving and willing to help us start again.

Millions of people around the world have been forced to start again due to disasters and emergencies they have experienced. Caritas, as love in action, plays a key role in enabling these communities to begin again by walking with them in solidarity at the hardest point in their lives when they have lost everything.

Recent emergencies in 2021







Indonesia

Caritas Indonesia responded to massive flooding and landslides caused by Cyclone Seroja. The disaster damaged or destroyed thousands of homes and forced many people to take refuge in evacuation centres. Catholic youth volunteers helped Caritas distribute items and clear debris and mud from people's homes. More than 181 people were confirmed dead, 12,344 were displaced, 47 were missing and 258 injured from the flash floods and cyclone which hit the East Nusa Tenggara islands on the 4th of April last year. 66,509 houses were affected during the flash floods and whirlwind.

Afghanistan

As a result of the Taliban's seizure of power in Afghanistan, thousands of refugees fled to neighbouring countries, including Pakistan, and there was an increasing need for humanitarian assistance. Caritas Pakistan provided food (dry rations), kitchen sets, bedding sets, shelter and hygiene kits.





Haiti experienced a devastating earthquake on 14 August 2021 (7.2 on the Richter scale). Many were affected and basic needs like food, water, tents, hygiene kits and first aid were provided by Caritas Haiti in immediate response.





Bangladesh



Caritas Bangladesh responded to a widespread fire in a Rohingya camp. Emergency teams on the ground were able

to re-build shelters and provide cash support. The fire left 45,000 homeless and over 120,000 in desperate need of sanitation. This disaster was the latest trauma to affect the Rohinyga population, one million of whom fled persecution in their homeland in Myanmar. Then terrible flooding impacted four hundred villages in Cox's Bazar later in 2021 and families were again left shelterless as everything was submerged. Food and clean water were needed.

Preferential Option for the Poor and

Vulnerable



Caritas India appealed for global solidarity to help them respond to a second wave of the COVID-19 pandemic which was ravaging the country. A record 300,000-plus daily infections were being recorded in India in 2021 and oxygen and medical supplies were running low and the healthcare system was challenged. Caritas India has been supporting communities throughout the pandemic. It mobilised staff and volunteers to operate a COVID information centre and offer food, primary healthcare and medical support, including oximeters and inhalers, in response to the second wave.

Sunday Gospel Reading

John 8:1-11

Summary:

- Jesus went to the Mount of Olives.
- As per usual, he went to the temple early in the morning.
- People came and he taught them.
- The scribes and the Pharisees caught a woman in adultery and brought her before the crowd and Jesus.
- They stated that the law of Moses commanded that the woman should be stoned to death.
- They asked Jesus what his response would be to test him so that they might have a charge to bring against him.
- Jesus said nothing but bent down and wrote his finger on the ground.
- They kept questioning him and so Jesus stood up and said "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."
- He the continued to write on the ground.
- The crowd left, one by one, until Jesus was alone with the woman.
- Jesus asked the woman, "Has no one condemned you?"
- She affirmed this before Jesus told her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again."

In Timor-Leste, 80% of women are not paid for their work. Caritas supports a women's group called HAFOTI that enables Timorese women to rise above their circumstances, and have greater confidence and enhanced dignity as family leaders and community participants.

By using a co-operative business model, HAFOTI members run micro-enterprises. Women have great opportunities to develop their individual skills in remote locations, gain access to resources, and earn an income for their families. HAFOTI empowers many of its members to ultimately progress into leadership and mentoring roles.

Reflection

In the Gospel reading the woman caught doing wrong does not have too many supporters and may have been killed if Jesus had not been in the temple. Jesus disarms the crowd and points out that only those who are perfect should do the judging. No-one met this description except Jesus himself. Yet he was quick to forgive and return the woman's dignity by giving her another opportunity and a reminder to change her ways.

Like Jesus, HAFOTI restores the dignity of women in Timor-Leste providing them with great opportunities. Many of the women have faced tough challenges in their lives and their connection to HAFOTI provides direction and hope for their future.



Sunday Gospel Reading

Luke 23:32-49

Summary:

- At the place called The Skull, Jesus is crucified along with two criminals.
- Jesus says, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."
- The soldiers cast lots to divide his clothing while the crowd watch.
- Leaders and soldiers challenge Jesus to save himself if he is indeed the Messiah.
- An inscription was placed over him saying, 'This is the King of the Jews.'
- One of the criminals yelled at Jesus and said, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"
- The other criminal rebuked him and reminded him that they were getting what they deserved for what they had done, but Jesus had done nothing wrong.
- He then asked Jesus to remember him when Jesus came into his kingdom.
- Jesus replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."
- Darkness then came over the land from midday to three in the afternoon.
- The curtain of the temple was torn in two and Jesus cried out with his last breath, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."
- The centurion seeing this firsthand knew that Jesus was innocent and praised God.
- The crowds that had gathered returned home beating their breasts.
- Jesus' friends, including the women from Galilee, stood watching at a distance.

Theme: The Greatest Gift of All

Holy Week is the culmination of Lent, as we remember the sacrifice of Christ on the cross. The manner of Jesus' death is unjust and horrific but it is the reality of the resurrection that brings hope, peace and life anew. Jesus, as the ultimate peacemaker, gave us the greatest gift of all – overcoming sin and death.

Reflection


As Jesus hung on the cross, he didn't cry out at the injustice of it all. He didn't cry out at the pain he was feeling. Instead he talked to God and was focused on forgiving those who had caused his suffering.

As Pope Francis points out, Jesus 'feels the whole weight of evil' yet he conquers it 'with the force of God's love'. He is indeed the greatest gift of all, the one who transforms our relationship with God for all eternity.

There are many observers at Jesus' crucifixion. It is interesting to reflect on who we most resemble...

Jesus' friends – sad and shocked watching at a distance; others in the crowd – angered at the injustice they saw; the centurion – whose life was amazingly changed by Jesus; the guards – who laughed and mocked Jesus; the criminals – who joined in Jesus' pain.

Even though we've heard the story of Jesus' crucifixion many times, let's stop and reflect on the impact for us personally.


