Do to others what you would have them do to you.
















How to use these prayers

This prayer resource contains 15 prayers that have been written or adapted to be used during Social Justice Week 2019. With the theme of fairness, these prayers are designed to help guide our focus on how the world can be a fairer place where love and justice reign.










Sharing your aroha

Fair, by thanking those who deserve it.


Fair, at home and at school.




Prayer for others


